### Myanmar Weekly Conflict Update (November 8 - 14, 2024)

#### **Civilian Casualties**

In the second week of November, airstrikes and heavy weapons attacks by the Military Council resulted in the deaths of 61 civilians across various regions of Myanmar, including 2 children and 7 women.

The Mandalay Region reported the highest number of fatalities, with 21 deaths, followed by 20 in northern Shan State, 8 in Sagaing Region, 4 each in Karenni State and Rakhine State, and 2 each in Bago Region and Southern Shan State. Of the casualties, 5 individuals were killed by heavy artillery fire, while 53 lost their lives due to air and drone attacks.

#### **Civilians' Houses Burnt Down**

The Military Council set fire to and destroyed 181 homes in one state and two regions of Myanmar, with 173 houses in Sagaing Region, 6 in Magway Region, and 2 in Chin State.

#### **Civilian Arrest**

In the second week of November, a total of 394 civilians were arrested across two states and four regions in Myanmar. The breakdown of arrests includes 200 in Southern Shan State, 87 in Mandalay Region, 51 in Bago Region, 44 in Sagaing Region, 7 in Irrawaddy Region, and 5 in Mon State.

#### **Aerial Assaults Against Civilian Targets**

During the second week of November, the Military Council conducted 35 airstrikes across four states and four regions in Myanmar. The airstrikes occurred 7 times in Chin State, 6 times in Mandalay Region, and 5 times each in Magway Region and Northern Shan State. Additionally, there were 4 airstrikes each in Rakhine State and Sagaing Region, 2 in Kachin State, and 1 each in Bago Region and Southern Shan State.

#### **Conflicts and Casualties of Combatants**

During the second week of November 2024, there were a total of 70 clashes, including drone attacks, across various regions. The Sagaing Region recorded the highest number of incidents, with 13 clashes, followed by Bago Region with 12, and Chin State with 11. Additionally, there were 8 clashes in Rakhine State, 6 each in Magway Region and Northern Shan State, 5 in Mandalay Region, 4 in Karen State, 3 in Kachin State, and 2 in Tanintharyi Region, Irrawaddy Region, Karenni State, and Mon State. Notably, there were no reported clashes in Southern Shan State and Yangon Region.

During this period, 111 soldiers from the Military Council were reported killed in the fighting.

On November 11, the Arakan Army (AA) fully seized control of the PePaDom checkpoint at the entrance to Ann City.


#### **Operations by KIA and Joint Forces**

On November 10, the Kachin Independence Army (KIA) captured the village of Lanse in Tsawlaw Township, Kachin State.


#### **Operations by KNLA and Joint Forces**
